The main speeches only are included, arranged in the order of affirmative-negative in each case. The University of Texas is a member of two intercollegiate debating leagues: The Triangular Debating League, consisting of the State Universities of Colorado, Missouri, and Texas; and the Pentagonal League of Southern State Universities, consisting of the State Universities of Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Tennessee, and Texas. In the Triangular League the question for debate was, Resolved, that a Policy of Compulsory Old Age Insurance should be adopted by the Federal Government, Constitutionality waived, Mr. Eugene H. Cavin of Galveston and Mr. Douglas Tomlinson of Hillsboro supported the affirmative of this question in a debate with the University of Colorado, held at Austin on April 18, 1913, the negative winning by a vote of two to one.
